



he Mystery of untold story of Kakuma refugee camp; is one of many mysteries stories of many

refugees' camps people untold; a place which had served and saved many human's lives and souls. Kakuma refugee Camp; But let me, to for those who might not have been or lives in Kakuma, let me put it in Parables and figurative language of Kakuma, as we know it as "HONG KONG CITY" or "machokcondok" in local people of Turkana's figurative language" meaning a land of dry desert for hasty souls, "the lifestyle of Noematic pastorals people". A place where many refugees people began their Lives and made it out; and now are successful human beings around the world. A place which had been a bacon and hope to refuge many people fleeing wars zone, giving them security and hope. one of many stories, among hundreds, if not thousands of refugee camps around the world, which has a story to tell the world in its essence.

In early 1980s and 1990s leading to 2000s, in eastern, central and northern Africa when wars were ramping countries such as Sudan, Somalia, Ethiopia, Uganda, Rwanda, Congo, Burundi and many other Southern African and Western countries of African continent. Many refugees' camps were set up to housed many of these refugees' people; with families of children without home or who were Orphans in those cases.

People who needed helps; fleeing the wars zones places, Refugee camps like Pinyaduk/Itang Refugee camp in Ethiopia/ Sudan northern border in 1988-1987 was set up.

Laboni/Poltanga refugee camp Sudan/Uganda Boarder in 1989 -1990 and then the largest of them all; been Kakuma refugee camp in Kenya/ Sudan Boarder in 1991 - 1992, which is still in its existences until today. Unlike many Refugees camps such as those of **PINYADUK** refugee camp where many of "RED ARMY BOYS -GIRLS - Born in 1975 - 1980" of Sudanese first generation dwells in or ITANG refugee camp where second generation "LOST BOYS - GIRLS -Born in 1980 - 1985" of Sudanese dwells. KAKUMA Refugee camp became a dwellings place for "GOLDEN BOYS - GIRLS - Born 1985 - 1990" of Sudanese fleeing war of SUDAN Government vs SPLM/A of 1983 -2005; whom most of them were with their families unlike red army boys – girls and Lost Boys – girls; who were by themselves due to either their parents were killed (Lost Boys -Girls) or them been taken ways by force from their families (Red army Boys - Girls) during war time. What was unique about Kakuma Refugee camp, Many of the RED AMRY BOYS - GIRLS (Villages and Pinyaduk), LOST BOYS - GIRLS (Itang - Politaka) AND GOLDEN BOYS - GIRLS (Kakuma) all emerged in Kakuma refugee camp and started life there. A place where many of innocence Souls had seen ray of lights down the tunnel.



Kakuma to me; was A land, God look down and sees many of sorrows and pains of innocence souls and reveals himself in mysteries ways of Lovings - Caring, healings - Provisions, blessings, Protections and Wisdoms through others human being who were helpers. For many of us, around the world who came from Kakuma or grow up in Kakuma, has now successful Lives; career and families of theirs own; who can attest to those memories. Those who came from that place, we call Kakuma today, know what I'm talking about here, either be our learning – education of schoolings experiences, works – jobs

or families; which are now our careers and lifestyles of families- children we have now; as majorities of us have their own families (wives and Childrens of their own). it all attribute to the life that started in Kakuma Refugee Camp, especially us the Golden Boys and Girls of South Sudaness of descend. The Genesis of it; was what we have now as successful life.

for most of us, it all began in Kakuma refugee camp "we the Golden Boys -Girls of **Kakuma**". Many of us today who are Professionals workers and servants in different field of our life; either them been Ph.Ds. holders and academic scholar like myself or many others who are, Writer, Authors, entrepreneurs, Inventor, Creators, Authors, Ph.Ds. Philanthropist, Researcher, Doctors, Nurses, Lawyers, Politicians, Scientists, Accountants, Business owner, ITS, Engineers, Pilots, Pastors, Teachers, Artists, Sport People, Polices, Mothers, Fathers and many more professionals careers we have, we call and have today, Most of them or even all began in Kakuma. as Most of us are living and working in offices, Homes, Business, Government, schools and churches all over the world either be our in-home land of South Sudan or In East Africa, America, Europe, Africa and Asia. Many of us hold business of theirs own and have created wealth, having their own children.

Many of us are holding top high-end positions and careers in an influencing positions of education sector, government sector and public and private sectors of Lifes, Laws and Spirits. Without Kakuma refugee camp experiences we had, schools we attended or lifestyle we build, many of us might have not have a chance and opportunity, we have today and successfully life careers we entitle to. The pinnacle of struggles, pain, suffering, trial and tribulation for many youngest like myself, who grown up in Kakuma, gave us the ignite of light into our dreams and starting point for some of us who came from nothings especially been a child out of war as your home was destroyed by war.

I believe many of us who came out in 2000 - 2006's mass migration out of Kakuma Refugee Camp to many other parts of the word such as Africa (East Africa countries:- Sudan – South Sudan – Kenya – Uganda - Ethiopia – Burundi – Tanzania, Rwanda and Congo), Asia (Australia – Pacific countries), Europe: -: America - Canada (Countries), after 12 years of living in the Kakuma refugee camp since 1992 of its inceptions, can

attest to what their life looks and become now, after Kakuma incubations of 12 years or more for others. Let me highlight the pinnacle of these success of Kakuma's mystery of untold stories, but first let me give you a little information about Kakuma refugee, so you will understand what I'm talking here, of what Kakuma had really done to people like myself and many other millions of people around the world.

or those who have lived and been to Kakuma refugee camp; will understand what I'm talking about here. But let me, touch

base on it for those who might not have been or lives in those Parables and figurative language of Kakumas, as we know it as "HONG KONG CITY" with it headquarter - CAPTIAL CITY known as HONG KONG 3 or "machokcondok" in local people of Turkana's figurative language" meaning a land of dry desert for hasty souls, "the lifestyle of Noematic pastorals people". During it inception and Genesis of Kakuma in 1992, it was name" Kakuma" by Sudaness Refugees People, who are now South Sudaness people after the country got its independency from its original sister country of Sudan; whom it has been in war for 24 years (1982 – 2005). Sudanese People who were the first people to make Kakuma a home, before others refugees of others countries came during it incubation of existence as a place.

The name Kakuma came from Nubians people of Sudan of Kurdufan region, word – "KAKA" meaning (First born son)-mixed with word MUM, MAAM or MAMA (meaning Mother) put together as "Kaka – Muma" but shorten to KAK-UMA, meaning first son of a mother "kaka – Muma"-Kakuma. Given in African cultural context of how a place or a house of a family; is attribute to a woman. It was considered that; Kakuma was a place of a woman and home for people; and so, it was attribute to a woman with her son who came out of suffering and looking for safety – Security and Peace. Kakuma refugee camp became a place for that safety, a place of peace and security, a place to call home for the woman with her son-child who flew the hurricane and horrible war, Pains, trials, Tribulation and suffering for those long walks of many months of bar foot-

trekking, without enough waters, foods and shelter to survive, which nearly killed her and her only child – son k ow as Kaka.

Kakuma Refugee Camp is located in Turkana District of the northwestern region of Kenya, 120 kilometers from Lowdar District, its Headquarters and 95 kilometers from the Lokichogio Kenya-Sudan border. Kakuma was carve out of nothing, it was a dry land full of dead trees, dry sandy soil and full of dist. Nothing was in it- no humans – animals or plants in it. It was a desert place with little life in it. Small bushes of tree here and there. It was un-inhabitable for humans due to it dry- hot climate weather with no rain on yearly basis. It so dry and dirty – with sandy storm that is unbearable for daily livings. No good source of water, foods and security as the whole land is of no life, infertile, and of no use for agriculture or farming purpose. It was a land full of dry and dead trees and bush thorns, which had to be cut down and clear away for people to build huts and muddy house to lives in from sandy - soils and grass – trees leave.

Established in 1992 by Sudanese people and theirs SPLM/A Militia government under DR John Garang Mabior's leadership, who was fighting Norther Sudan government under Omar Bashir Leadership. With full protection of world Humanitarian agencies such as UN, WFP, World Vision, IOM, Red Cross. To serve those Sudanese refugees who were been forcibly displaced from their home country due to war or persecution by government during second civil war (1983 - 2005) of Sudan between Khartoum government and Southerner Liberation army know was SPLM (Sudan People Liberation Movement), which later became independent country of South Sudan in 2011.

Kakuma has since expanded to serve refugees from Somalia, Ethiopia, Burundi, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Eritrea, Uganda, and Rwanda. According to current UNHCR statistics, the camp population stands at just close to 180,000 refugees. In 2007, Kakuma Refugee Camp hosted 21% of the total refugee population in Kenya (UNHCR Fact Sheet, September 2008).

The local Kenyan population is largely comprised of nomadic pastoralists from the Turkana community. According to the 1999 Kenya Census, the population of Kakuma town is 97,114 persons, making it nearly twice as populous as the camp. Humanitarian Aid and Governance of Kakuma Refugee Camp is administered by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR). The UNHCR is assisted in its duties by a wide range of organizations, including World Food Program (WFP), International Organization for Migration (IOM), Lutheran World Federation (LWF), International Rescue Committee (IRC), Jesuit Refugee Services (JRS), National Council of Churches of Kenya (NCCK), Windle Trust Kenya (WTK), Film Aid International, and Salesians of Don Bosco in Kenya.

The camp falls under the jurisdiction of the Kenyan Government and the Department of Refugee Affairs. Since the adoption of the Kenya Refugee Act in 2007, a Camp Manager has been appointed to oversee camp affairs and liaison with

humanitarian agencies. The Act paves the way for the Kenyan Government to eventually assume full management of Kakuma Refugee Camp.

Encamping in Kakuma, since its inception in 1992, which took us 12 years from its inception to the time, when most of people left to western world, eastern world and Africa countries at large. 12 years in Kakuma (1992 – 2003) when most of people left in early 2000 – to – 2006 of Mass Migration to America, Canada, Australia and Eastern African countries (Sudan, Kenya, Uganda and Egypt), was where a lot of people lives and survive from the wars, as it was well protected and secured from the enemies that was killing many people from east Africa Nations.

When we all arrived in Kakuma; it was a forest full of trees, dry land with no life in it. But it became indeed a place of refuge for many people who were flew war zone either be from Sudan, Somalia, Burundi, Rwanda and many other African nation people who were in the camp. Life was challenging and hard; it was like been in a prison. One of the biggest problems with refugeehood is that society relegates one to a second-class human being.

Kakuma became a home to many people, the most famous of all people in there were "Lost boy of Sudan"-Refugees with people from most of east African countries. It was a place of hope out of dispersity and chaos of wars. A place of security, a light down the tunnel for many mothers, fathers, youngers and those seeking better life. A place that gave dreamers hope and purpose to find their meanings of life. There in Kakuma; GOD was able to breathe life into people. Everyone was able to access helps from many people around the world; with essential thing such as foods, waters, through UNHCR, WORLD food programs and many others agencies who came from different part of the world to help us as refugees in the camp. We access education and many basic needs that were able to get from anyone who was helping us through GOD.

One without rights and not deserving of dignified treatment or service. Refugees are restricted from engaging in many economic activities which can help them become self-reliant. Facilities are poorly equipped and inadequate, institutions understaffed, and resources

are highly limited. Ultimately, the mood becomes that of unwelcomed visitor who has overstayed his visit. Environment Life in the semi-arid desert environment of Kakuma is rather challenging. The area has always been full of problems: dust storms, high temperatures, poisonous spiders, snakes, and scorpions, outbreaks of malaria, cholera, and other hardships. The average daytime temperature is 40 degrees Celsius, or 104 degrees Fahrenheit. Economy Due to their legal situation and local environmental conditions, refugees are largely unable to support themselves with income-generating activities. The semi-arid climate of Kakuma is ill-suited to agriculture, while restrictions on employment deter refugee job-seeking. Those who work with NGOs receive a small incentive payment for their work, but incentive staff represent only a fraction of the refugee population. Basic needs were provided by the United Nations High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR),

Resources were scarce and hardly enough to cater for all refugees. Food was distributed after every fifteen days and after ten days, it was depleted in almost all the refugee households. However, due to the Jieng and African communal lifestyle of togetherness and familyhood in socialist- communal society, we would eat at any relative's houses. Although some time when things go South; by day twelve in every household and all would have exhausted their ration foods and no amount of moving from one household to another or communal help would cure the hunger. Those few days, before foods come into distribution center were known as "BLACK DAYS"

As a result, days twelve to fifteen in every food distribution cycle were dubbed, "THE BLACK DAYS". Kakuma became a place ripe with hopelessness and desperation. The only window of opportunity was if you were a 'Lost Boy' (unaccompanied minor) – as there was a chance of being resettled in the United States of America. Resettlement was, as it felt then, a one in a thousand chance. Nonetheless, it became a place of hope that after all, the 'fittest' can transform their circumstances through the limited opportunities (either scholarships or resettlement) in the camp.

oming to Kakuma in 1992 - 1995, a journey from whole of Sudan region; Foots tracking, beginning from Northern part of Sudan

(Upper Nile Region) in a village of Abwong, since I was born into, foot-tracking on bear- foots in the forest of Adon, Malakal, akobo, Nasir, Itang, Pinyaduk, Pinychalla, (Lower Nile) Kapoeta, entenbi, Loboni, New Cush, Shukudum, Nairus, Lokichogio and into Kakuma refugee camp was a difficult journey, given how I was a child in those days of my life. It was painful and hard with a lot of suffering, seen a lot of things a child, I could never want any child to experienced. To cut the story short and into my Kakuma story.

Here forth, in KAKUMA Refugee camp, located in norther part of Kenya, Turkana land "Turkana land", is where my life transformed into meaningful life. In Kakuma I got to experienced and learned one of the best culture, people and life, I EVER SEEN AND KNOWN in my life. I was able to go to school, and began to learn properly, I was able to learn living with other in at home, community, courtship, school, church.

Kakuma lifestyle was hard and challenging, for those who knew it really well. It was a camp in a desert place and it wasn't meant for the functionally of any existence of any species, let alone we humans' beings. It was a desert hot, dry place that doesn't hold no life. But we all managed to lives in it for 12 Years 1992 – 2006 for most of the people before; the mass migration of "2000 -2006" to others part of the world mainly America – Australia and East Africa nations. It taught me a lot of valuable lessons of life and as I said, one of those lesson was the caring and loving nurture, I learn from my mother while we were in a big family, community and as people of Jieng and others tribes of South Sudan. Caring for each other regardless, if we had something to eat, or when someone is sick, we all care for each other's.

My life was finding it meaning and it purpose as I began to understand my existences among my family, relatives, friends, kinships and many others humans who were living in Kakuma. As Kakuma was centre point for many other refugees from other countries within east African nations such as those who were Ethiopians - Somalian, Congolese, Burundians and Sudaness. I was living with many people, but mostly with Jieng, Nuers, Shilluk, Nubians, Equatorian People of Sudan. Here, I got to learn Jieng Cultures, as Mony Jieng myself and Jieng been Ethnicity on many sub-tribes to it, full of many of different clans and families in it. Although, they all difference in small aspects of them, small things like dialects, norms and lifestyles. Although they are the largest ethicity of Nilotic race of people, each Jieng sections has their own ways of doing things, either be in their lifestyles, spoken dialects and cultural beliefs, they all little differences. But, in most case they are same lifestyle of keeping cattle, life principles, and many norms, values they all shares with each other. Many tasks, in the household help me understand life and it meaning while been a teenager and youth. Learning Jieng culture was one of the things that stood out, in my life. Which I will talk about it later more in my last remarks. But, the most important part of learning Lifestyle was not just only living with my family, but living with my relatives, from my dad and mother side, All of my uncles, Aunties, Cousins, Friends, relatives and kinships.

Here, I was able to learn about the importance of relationship. I was able to build bone and relationship both at home, and in communities, courtship, schools, church. Living with different people, and learning about who they are. I had a lot of people from many places of east Africa countries who were living in the camp as refugees. Living with my mother's people, was a blessing. They most caring, kindly and friendly people I ever met in my life. Most of my uncles and Aunties who were living with us and Ngok lual Yak people at large, are most of the people I still valued in my life, they most until today, because of what whey shown me in those time, it was something extraordinary and life inspiring as a culture. I learn their ways of life, which is the most amazing and beautiful lifestyle among tribe of Jieng.

Lifestyles of love, wholeheartedly, kindness, caring, politeness and honesty. I was able to learned the most amazing lifestyle in the whole world from Ngok Lual Yak people. Many whom I dearly hold in my heart, and appreciate them for filling in the role, my father and his people would have done if they were living with us, but due to war of Sudan, many of my father's people had passed away including my father himself and due to migration of us into foreigners' lands, we were unable to lives among them, which I understand now as an adult. But my materiality family did fill in those roles really well and I'm thankful to them for doing a great job.

Our home, with my mother, 3 brothers and my younger sister, was the most caring, loving and nurturing place I ever experienced love, kindness, Grace, Joy and happiness. My mother taught us values of togetherness, respecting, caring,

sharing, kindnesses, politeness and thanksgiving to each other. Everything we used to do, was for each other, even when she cooks food, she would call us and we all sit down together and we share the small food we have. She was a woman of class. As she came from a well-respected family and well- known people among Jieng deities, but she still holds herself with humbleness and honesty, which where values I still hold them in my life until now.

She taught us, understanding, how to understand each other, love one another, care and be thankful to everything you and mostly importantly she was always with GOD. In every meal dinner, she would take us through prayers and praise GOD for helping her to raised us, she knew from the start, it wasn't her only understanding and strength, that was doing all that she was doing for us, but something bigger than her, the help of GOD and so she would always give thanks to heaven.

Kind- hearted person and loving mother, I would never exchange for anything in this life. I was lucky as a child to have her as a mother, because what we been through in life, only GOD know it. Home was the place to be, for me as I would enjoy the comfort of my mother, siblings and relative. We would share stories of our journey during war time, evening time, after we had dinner and would either laugh at good time or be sorry-full at sad moments, but it was all fun. Learning the importance of togetherness and family bond- values. I would go to distribution centre at UN compound, to collect foods after every two week (15 days) and help my mother, sister with

fetching water at nearby fetching water tap. And on the time, I 'm not doing those things, I would go to school or hang-out with my friends playing soccer or basketball. Life was good.

Me and my siblings who are, now living in Australia, are product of Kakuma story and even thou our life didn't began in Kakuma, as it originally began in Sudan "Upper Nile Region of Sudan and now South Sudan (Malakal city – Ngok land). That part of our life, living in Kakuma is a testimony of what Kakuma did to us and contributed to our successful Lifes we have today.

Living in Kakuma was hard and challenging for us as a family, for those who knew it really well. It was a camp in a desert place and it wasn't meant for the functionally of any existence of any species, let alone we humans' beings. It was a desert hot, dry place that doesn't hold no life. But we all managed to lives in it for 12 Years 1992 -2006 for most of the people before; the mass migration of "2000 -2006" to others part of the world mainly America – Australia and East Africa nations. It taught us a lot of valuable lessons of life and as I said, one of those lesson was the caring and loving nurture as family, we all learn from our mother while we were in a big family, community and as people of Jieng and others tribes of South Sudan. Caring for each other regardless, if we had something to eat, or when someone is sick, we all care for each other's.

Our life was finding it meaning and it purpose as we began to understand our existences as family and livings among our, relatives, friends, kinships and many others humans who were living in Kakuma. As Kakuma was centre point for many other refugees from other countries within east African nations such as those who were Ethiopians - Somalian, Congolese, Burundians and Sudaness. I was living with many people, but mostly with Jieng, Nuers, Shilluk, Nubians, Equatorian People of Sudan. Here, I got to learn Jieng Cultures, as Mony Jieng myself and Jieng been Ethnicity on many subtribes to it, full of many of different clans and families in it. Although, they all difference in small aspects of them, small things like dialects, norms and lifestyles. Although they are the largest ethicity of Nilotic race of people, each Jieng sections has their own ways of doing things, either be in their lifestyles, spoken dialects and cultural beliefs, they all little differences. But, in most case they are same lifestyle of keeping cattle, life principles, and many norms, values they all shares with each other. Many tasks, in the household help us understand life and it meaning while been a teenager and youth. Learning Jieng culture was one of the things that stood out, in my life. Which I will talk about it later more in my last remarks. But, the most important part of learning Lifestyle was not just only living as a family, but living with my relatives, from my dad and mother side, All of my uncles, Aunties, Cousins, Friends, relatives and kinships.

Here, we were able to learn the importance of relationship and togetherness. we were able to build bone and relationship both at home, and in communities, courtship, schools, church. Living with different people, and learning about who they are. we had a lot of people from many places of east Africa countries who were living in the camp as refugees. Living with my mother's people, was a blessing. They most caring, kindly and friendly people I ever met in my life. Most of my uncles and Aunties who were living with us and Ngok lual Yak people at large, are most of the people I still valued in my life, they most until today, because of what whey

shown us in those time, what it was to life extraordinary and life inspiring as a culture. we learn their ways of life, which is the most amazing and beautiful lifestyle among tribe of Jieng.

Lifestyles of love, wholeheartedly, kindness, caring, politeness and honesty. We were able to learned the most amazing lifestyle in the whole world from Ngok Lual Yak people. Many whom we dearly hold in my heart, and appreciate them for filling in the role, my father and his people would have done if they were living with us, but due to war of Sudan, many of my father's people had passed away including my father himself and due to migration of us into foreigners' lands, we were unable to lives among them, which I understand now as an adult. But my materiality family did fill in those roles really well and I'm thankful to them for doing a great job.

Our home, with my mother, 3 brothers and my younger sister, was the most caring, loving and nurturing place I ever experienced love, kindness, Grace, Joy and happiness. My mother taught us values of togetherness, respecting, caring, sharing, kindnesses, politeness and thanksgiving to each other. Everything we used to do, was for each other, even when she cooks food, she would call us and we all sit down together and we share the small food we have. She was a woman of class. As she came from a well-respected family and well- known people among Jieng deities, but she still holds herself with humbleness and honesty, which where values I still hold them in my life until now.


She taught us, understanding, how to understand each other, love one another, care and be thankful to everything you and mostly importantly; she was always with GOD. In every meal dinner, she would take us through prayers and praise GOD for helping her to raised us, she knew from the start, it wasn't her only understanding and strength, that was doing all that she was doing for us, but something bigger than her, the help of GOD and so she would always give thanks to heaven.

Kind-hearted person and loving mother, I would never exchange her for anything in this life. We were lucky as children to have her as a mother, because what we been through in life, only GOD know it. Home was the place to be, for me as I would enjoy the comfort of my mother, siblings and relative. We would share stories of our journey during war time, evening time, after we had dinner and would either laugh at good time or be sorry-full at sad moments, but it was all fun. Learning the importance of togetherness and family bond- values. I would go to distribution centre at UN compound, to collect foods after every two week (15 days) and help my mother, sister with fetching water at nearby fetching water tap. And on the time, I 'm not doing those things, I would go to school or hang-out with my friends playing soccer or basketball. Life was good.

ON EDUCATION: -

All of my 3 brothers including me and my younger sister; we all got educated in world prestigious Universities of (Monash University, Melbourne University, Australian National University, Swinburne University; RMIT University; Catholic University; Open University of Netherlands) just to name few. My elder brother Nyok Achuoth Gor, been well known Public Figure on World Stage and African, Playing Vitol role within South Sudan Politic as a world Peace Champion for South Sudan Initiative of Change. Educational; Him been a Graduate of Monash University, Australian National University- ANU and Melbourne University - school of Law, with both undergraduate Bachelor and Master Degrees and currently doing his Juris Doctor (JD) at school of Law in Melbourne University, Australia. Having his personal Family of 4 children and then working with Australian Humans right as Lawyer in Melbourne Base firm. And on final note of him recently buying his second house for his family. is an attest of a true Kakuma life testimony.

My second brother, Mading Achuoth Gor, educational been a Pilot of a double Degrees holder in Aviation and Business Finance at Swinburn University in Australia and currently working in Banking industry as Banker Advisory with one of leading Australian Bank; Australian National Bank (ANZ) firm in Melbourne Australia. Having his own Business of Private school back in South Sudan; Having his own family wife and 2 children, who recently came from Africa on a Private visa with his own Funds, is Braveness of Kakuma Story.




Adut was born in Sudan; in an area that later became part of South Sudan, but was raised in Kakuma Refugee camp, Kenya. She was 7 years old when she moved away from Kenya along with her mother and siblings to Adelaide, Australia as South Sudanese. Having spent her earliest days as a refugee, Adut and her family eventually migrated to Adelaide, Australia, where she lived out her life as a student and joined a local modeling agency.

Adut Akech was scouted multiple times in her early teens but it wasn't until she turned 16 that she was cast in her first major show – Saint Laurent's spring/summer 2017 – during; which time she signed to Elite Model Management. In 2016, she was cast as a global exclusive for Anthony Vaccarello's debut Saint Laurent show. Since then, she has become the muse of renowned designers, such as Valentino's Pierpaolo Piccioli, who brought her to the 2018 Met Gala, and Chanel's Karl Lagerfeld, who has tapped Adut to open and close multiple shows for the brand. In 2022, Akech worked several fall fashion campaigns including Michael Kors and Victoria's Secret. He had been involved with South Sudan people and communities around the Globe as a leader here in Victoria and even helped with transition of Peace process of 2000 – 2005 and into self- governance of 2006 -2011 leading into Independency process of South Sudan becoming Independent in 2011 from Sudan.

Ten years on from South Sudan becoming independent, South Sudanese Australians reflect on the highs and lows of the last decade, and their hopes of the country achieving the prosperity independence promised but is yet to deliver.

Nyadol who is currently a lawyer, community advocate, writer, and accomplished public speaker, she was born in a refugee camp in Itang, Ethiopia, and raised in Kakuma Refugee camp, Kenya. In 2005, at the age of eighteen, she moved to Australia as a refugee. Having escaped a bitter war for independence of southern Sudan, Nyadol's mother and siblings sought sanctuary at a refugee camp in Itang, Ethiopia. It was there, in the camp, that Nyadol was born in 1987. Four years later, local conflict forced the family to take a gruelling month and half foot-trekking back to Sudan and eventually on to Kakuma refugee camp, in norther part of Kenya, one of the world's largest refugee camps. In 2005, Nyadol and her family finally found a place of permanence, resettling in Australia as part of the Federal Government's Refugee and Humanitarian Programme. From the moment she arrived, she has chased down her dreams of studying law with a resolute focus. Given her determination and resilience, earning a place at the Melbourne Law School in 2011.

Since she came from Kakuma, where she finished her Primary school (K.C.P.E) and Secondary school (K.C.S.E) to Australia, Victoria Melbourne land of opportunities, she has obtained her academic trophies of education excellences. Her first Degree, Bachelor of Art at Victoria University in Victoria, Australia, follow by Juris doctoral degree of Law at Melbourne university in Victoria, Australia. She is a vocal advocate for human rights, multiculturalism, the settlement of people with refugee experiences and those seeking asylum. She has worked and volunteered extensively in these areas with a range of organisations.

Nyadol Nyuon is also a regular media commentator in these areas, having appeared on ABC's The Drum, as a panellist on Q&A and contributing to The Age, Sydney Morning Herald and the Saturday Paper, to name just a few. In 2018, after speaking publicly on race and human rights issues – including exaggerated media coverage of so-called African gangs and COVID-19 law-breakers. Despite this, Nyadol has continued to be a powerful voice for human rights. She's an Advisory

Committee Member of the Andrew & Renata Kaldor Centre for International Refugee Law and Chair of Harmony Alliance – Australia's migrant and refugee women's coalition, where she's empowering migrant women, including improving their digital literacy. Nyadol has won the Harmony Alliance Award, the Afro-Australian Student Organisation 's Unsung Hero Award and was co-winner of the Tim McCoy Prize. In both 2011 and 2014, she was nominated as one of the hundred most influential African Australians. In 2016, she was the recipient of the Future Justice Prize. In 2018 her efforts to combat racism were widely recognised, with achievements including the Australian Human Rights Commission's Racism. It Stops with Me Award. The prestigious award was in recognition of her advocacy and activism on behalf of the Australian-African and Melbourne's South Sudanese communities.



He joined SBS Radio in 2013 as Executive Producer for the Dinka program.

Since joining SBS Radio, Ajak has interviewed many Australian officials including former Minister Philip Ruddock, Adam Bandt of the Australian Greens and Senator Kate Lundy. Ajak has also interviewed countless South Sudanese government officials, opposition members and activists since the Dinka program's inception. Ajak and the SBS Radio Dinka team have broadcast informative, moving, sometimes controversial and often life-changing stories that have been so positively received by the South Sudanese diaspora, including exclusive coverage of South Sudan's conflict.

Ajak holds a Bachelor in Information Technology. When not working, he is an avid photographer and provides civic education on issues such as parenting, cultural values and understanding of cross-cultural differences. In addition to being a motivational speaker, Ajak enjoys learning more about other cultures. He speaks five languages – Arabic, Kiswahili, Dinka, Anyuak, and English. Following his move to Australia from Kakuma Refugee Camp to Australia. Where he studies and began his worked as a lawyer for many years before setting up is own firm in Melbourne city.

Ajak is an executive director of Ajak & associates law firm, a company he set-up himself, after he began working as a lawyer at Thomson Geer in Adelaide before going on to practise in Sydney at Salvos Legal. In 2017, after seeing regular media coverage about African youth crime in Melbourne, Daniel felt a need to relocate to Victoria and position himself as a role model for younger people within his South Sudanese community. He went on to work at a Melbourne Criminal Law Specialist firm, practising in summary and indictable crime. Ajak graduated from Flinders University with a Bachelor of Law and Legal Practice and a Bachelor of Commerce (Finance) in 2015 and was admitted to practice in the Supreme Court of South Australia and the High Court of Australia.

Daniel's upbringing, work ethic, tenacity, community and vision all guided him to a dynamic Life in the Law, where he became a lawyer at Victorian Legal Aid and an active member of the Australia African community. Daniel has featured in the Herald Sun, the Law Institute of Victoria's Journal & recently in the Age, sharing his journey from a refugee camp to settling in Australia and becoming an Australian legal practitioner. AYOR MAKUR CHUOT POLITICIAN: - WA'S MP



Hon. Ayor Makur Chuot MLC, Member for North Metropolitan Region, is the first South Sudan-Australian woman elected to the Parliament of Western Australian.

Born in Ethiopia, Ms Chuot and her family moved to South Sudan, only to flee to Kenya, Kakuma Refugee camp, after her father was killed during a civil war of Sudan in 1982 - 2005. She was raised by her single mother in a family of seven and for twelve years they lived in Kakuma, refugee camp in Kenya. The family moved to Perth after those 12 years in Kakuma Refugee camp, before arriving in Australia. On the 24th of May 2021, Ayor proudly became the first person of South Sudanese descent to sit in any Parliament in Australia, as a member of labour Party in Western Australian Legislative Council representing the North Metropolitan region.

Born in an Ethiopian refugee camp, Ayor returned to South Sudan with her parents at the age of two. Soon after, her father died in the war for independence. Ayor, her mother and siblings fled the turmoil for the Kakuma Refugee Camp in Kenya where they lived for a decade. They arrived in Perth in 2005, when she was fifteen.

After the initial culture shock, she settled into the northern suburbs, studied English as a third language and at seventeen, graduated from Aranmore Catholic College. At nineteen, while studying at TAFE and raising her first child, she was approached by a modelling agency which led to a successful international modelling career. Ayor walked the catwalks of New York City and London; modelled in South Africa, New Zealand, Cayman Island and throughout Australia. She was the Face of Perth 2010 and Miss South Sudan Australia 2010.

During this time, she completed a diploma in business management. In 2013, she stepped away from modelling, and

realised one of her dreams: to open a South Sudanese restaurant and share her love of food and culture.

Juggling family and work life, Ayor went on to study a business degree at Edith Cowan University. After graduating, she worked in accounting at the university, and at Emmanuel Christian Community School. Ayor also set up her own community events and created a show called 'Face of South Sudan' to celebrate diversity and the beauty and resilience of black women. In 2017 she established her own modelling agency to mentor and promote models from diverse backgrounds - to further encourage diversity in the fashion industry.

At one of her events she met former Labor MP, Janine Freeman, who recognised Ayor's dedication to community and encouraged her to run for the upper house. Ayor values representation greatly and took up the challenge to become a new voice in WA Parliament. Only days before being sworn in, she gave birth to her second son. Ayor is passionate about multiculturalism, women's interests, families and youth. She is committed to improving opportunities for refugees and migrants in the workforce having overcome many barriers herself.

Every day, she is working towards positive outcomes for the North Metropolitan Region in the key areas of jobs, education, health, infrastructure, and local projects.



Ayor Makur Chuot is WA's first MP of South Sudaness. Once an international model, the 31-year-old accountant is set to become Western Australia's first MP of South Sudaness and Australia's first South Sudanese MP.

Awer who is currently a Professional soccer Player star; who play for Australian National Team; is a mystery successful story of a Kakuma refugee camp on another level. A national beacon of hope for many youths in Australia and South Sudan. Awer was born to South Sudanese parents in Kakuma refugee camp, located in northwestern part of Kenya. He lived with his family in Kakuma Refugee Camp until the age of 10, when they moved to Australia and settled in Adelaide. After resettling with his family to Australia from Kakuma refugee camp; as part of the Australian Federal Government's Refugee and Humanitarian Programs under UN agency. From the moment he arrived, he has achieved a lot of things, Following his move from Kakuma Refugee Camp.

Here Australia; where he studies and began his worked as a professional player for many years before becoming a national icon for Australian national team. He first began playing soccer at the Kenyan refugee camp at around the age of five, stating: "We would just go outside and start kicking around. It was not structured and there was little else to do". They played with bare feet and used a rolled-up sock as a football. During a 2022 World Cup qualifier, Awer said "I was born in a hut, a little hut. My hotel room here is definitely bigger than the hut, the room we had as a family in that refugee camp".

Coming to Australia and growing up, Mabil attended St Columba College throughout his teenage years in Adelaide, graduating in 2013. In his professional career as a

soccer-Football player; has plays as a winger for La Liga club Cádiz. Awer played youth soccer at South Australian National Training Centre and with Adelaide United. He made his senior debut for Campbelltown City, before making his debut in the A-League for Adelaide United in 2013. He represents the Australia national team.

Awer co-founder of the humanitarian charity Barefoot to Boots, which aims to improve health, education, and gender equality among refugees, as well as equipping young refugees with sports equipment. In January 2023 he was named Young Australian of the Year.

AKECH MAKUR CHUOT

AUSTRALIAN FOOTBALL PLAYER: - AFLW



AKECH: - Known for her elite athleticism and long kicking, the rebounding defender brings an impressive dash off half-back. Makur Chuot has played 12 games for Richmond, adding to the six she played at Fremantle in the inaugural AFLW season.

AKECH was born on 5 September 1992 in South Sudan, the same year her father died. She was raised by her single mother in a family of seven and for twelve years they lived in Kakuma, refugee camp in Kenya. The family moved to Perth after spending nine years of her childhood in Kakuma Refugee camp, before arriving in Australia at the age of 12. She attended Aranmore Catholic College. Her sister is Ayor Makur Chuot, a member of the Western Australian Legislative Council representing the North Metropolitan region.






At 12 years, started playing soccer in primary school and later shifted to Australian Football (AFL) where she became the first African girl to be drafted to the girl's team in Western Australia. After many years of playing both soccer and AFL, Akech was drafted to AFL Women's National Team.

In 2009, she tried Australian Rules football for the first time at an East Perth Football Club all-girls carnival. Akech was drafted by Fremantle with their 18th selection and 139th overall in the 2016 AFL Women's draft. She was also one of the Australian Post Multicultural Ambassadors for the 2017 season. She made her debut in the thirty-two-point loss to the Western Bulldogs at VU Whitten Oval in the opening round of the 2017 season. She played every match in her debut season except for the round six match Carlton against due to being omitted, and finished with six matches. She was delisted at the end of the 2017 season.

In 2018, she moved to Victoria to play with Carlton in the VFL Women's state competition and then she played with Richmond in the VFL Women's in 2019 and signed for the club ahead of the 2020 AFL Women's season. She made her club debut against Carlton at Ikon Park in the opening round of the 2020 season.

At the end of 2022 season 6 with 4 new clubs joining the AFLW Akech decided to move to Hawthorn. In Round 1, Akech played in their inaugural match against Essendon, she had 8 disposals.

"It's unbelievable, it's a dream come true," forward Nuni Omot told Olympics.com. "We became an independent country in 2011. Everything that's happened in these last couple of years... No one ever imagined or dreamed of being in this position. Now we're going to have the chance to walk across the Olympic stage with our flag. I'm so emotional right now. I'm just very blessed to be a part of it."

The country gained its independence from Sudan in 2011. South Sudan's basketball team is ranked No. 62 in the world and just played its first international contest six years ago.

"It's an unbelievable story. It's an underdog story that, not just for the South Sudanese, not just for Africa, but for the rest of the world," Deng told ESPN, as he struggled to hold back tears. "It's a feel-good story that [a] majority of people can relate to. It's such a unique achievement because it's beyond basketball."


